

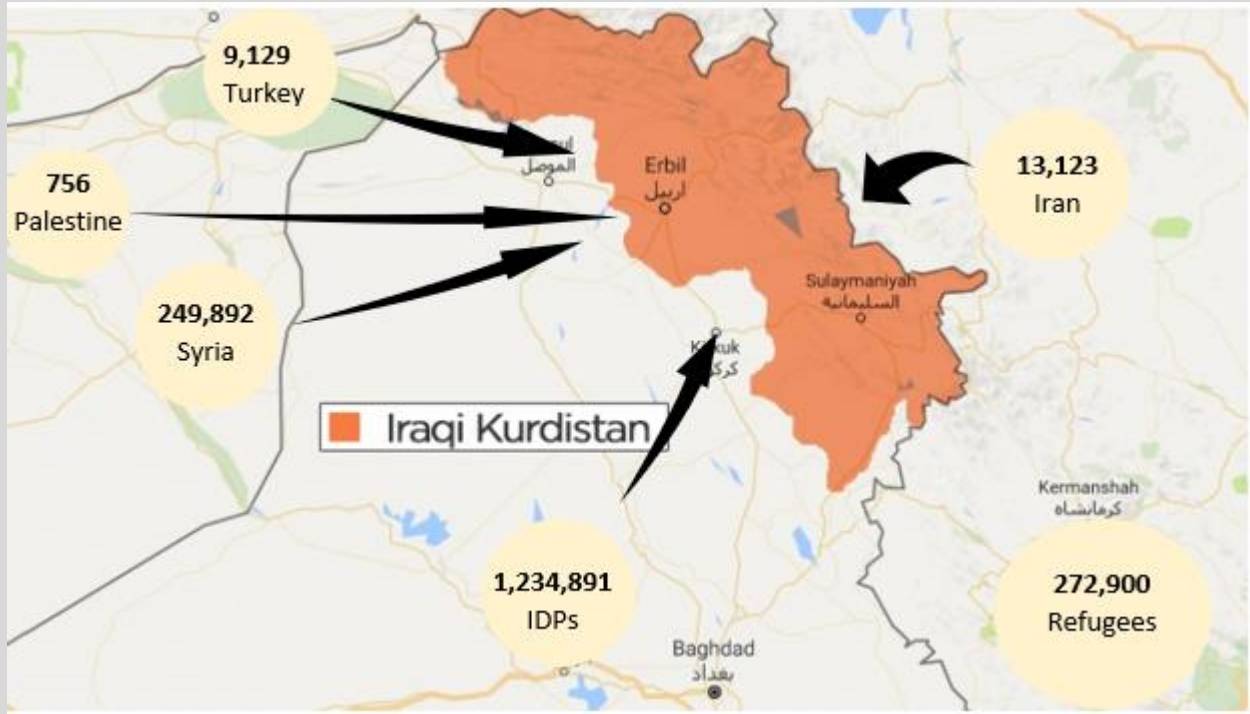

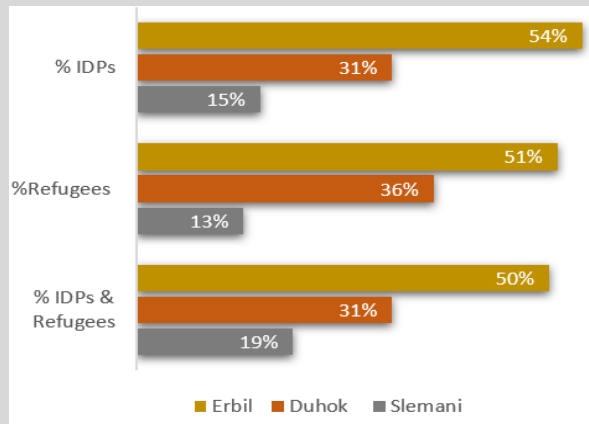

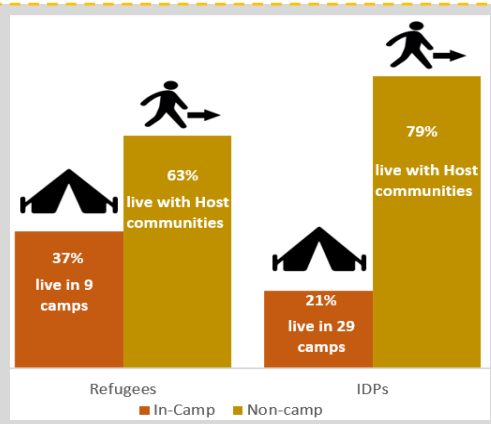


Currently the KRG is the host of 249,892 Syrian, 9,129 Turkish, 13,123 Iranian, and 756 Palestinian refugees. Contrary to popular perception, the majority of IDPs and refugees live with the host communities in the Region, while only 37 percent living in the 38 camps. 50 percent of the total displaced population live in Erbil, 31 percent in Duhok, and 19 percent in Slemani.

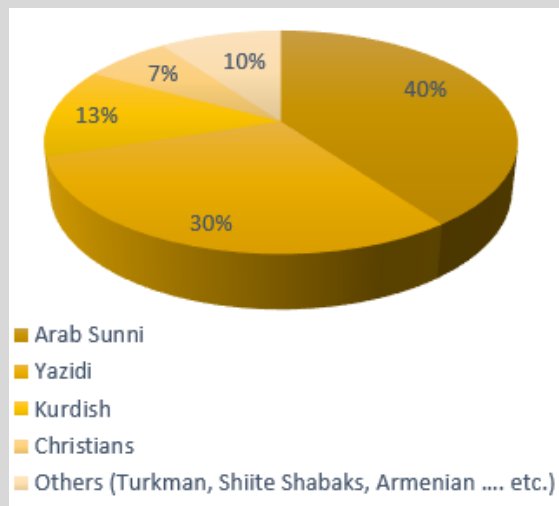

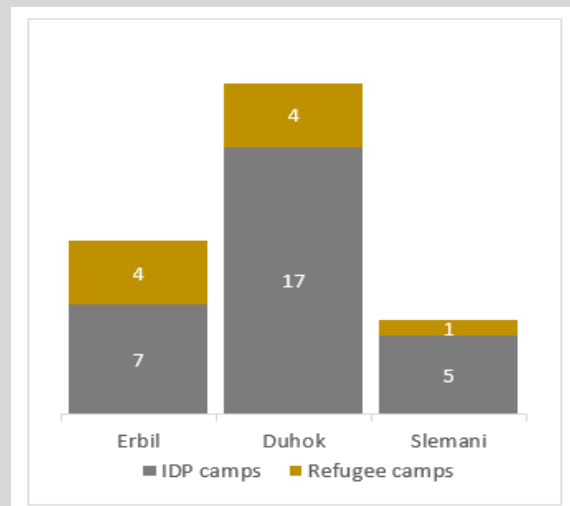

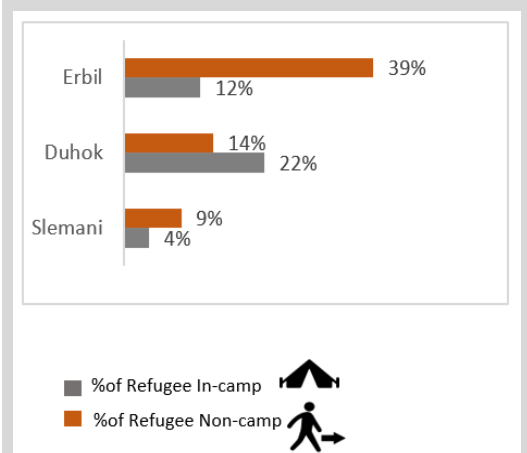

## Total Number of Refugees (In-camp and Non-camp)



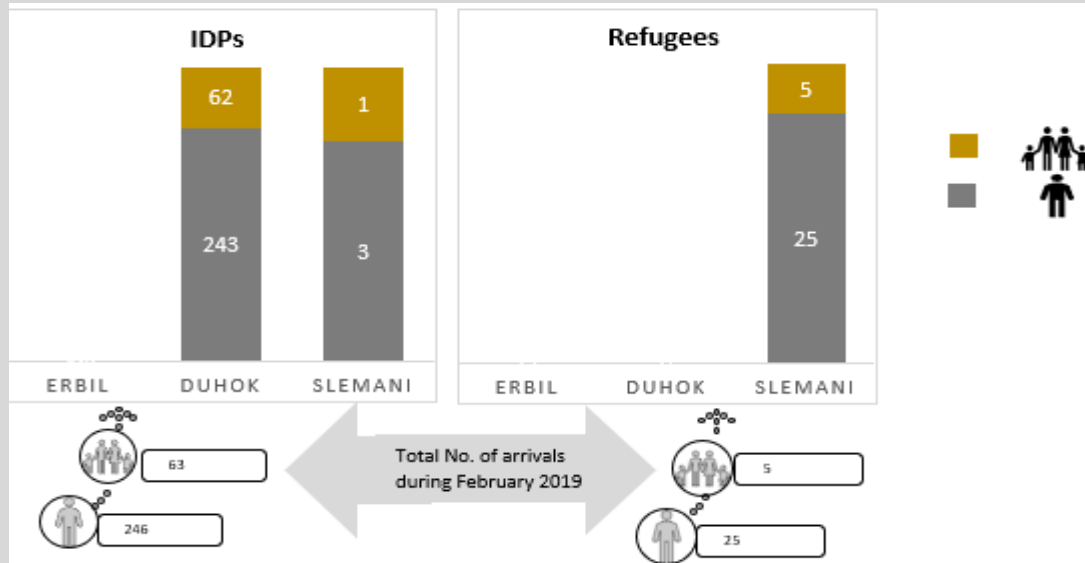

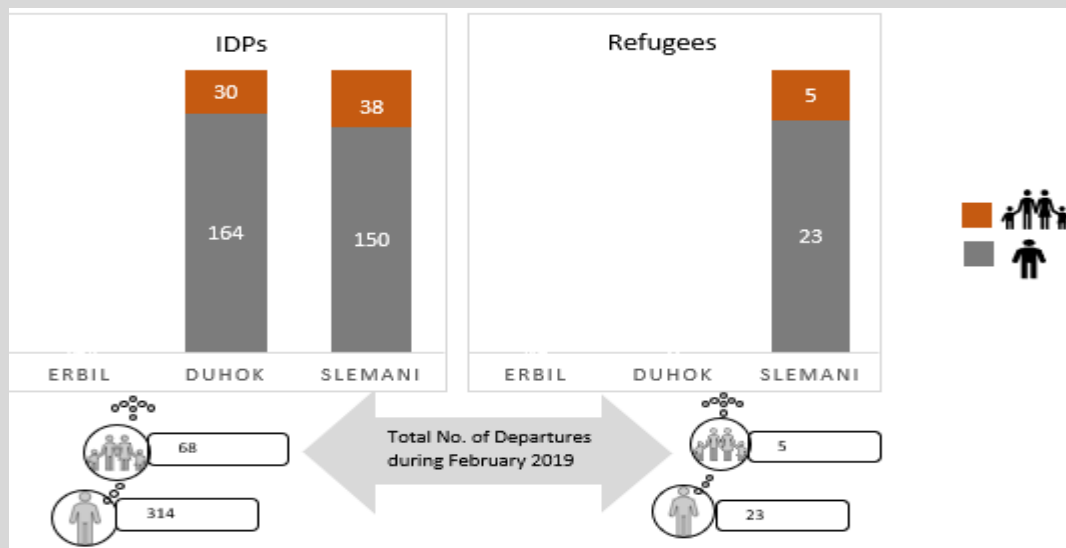

## New and Second Displacement to KRI



## IDPs and Refugees left KRI; Returned or Migrated



As highlighted, the displacement continued throughout the 2019 and still people are compelled to leave their areas for security, livelihood, and economic reasons and come to the Kurdistan, in February 2019, as many as 271 IDPs and refugees entered the Kurdistan Region. Nearly 246 of them were IDPs and 25 were Syrian refugees. Additionally, up to 337 internally displaced persons and Syrian refugees have left the Kurdistan Region in January 2019; either returning to their places of origin in the liberated areas or migrated to Europe and other countries legally and through other means.

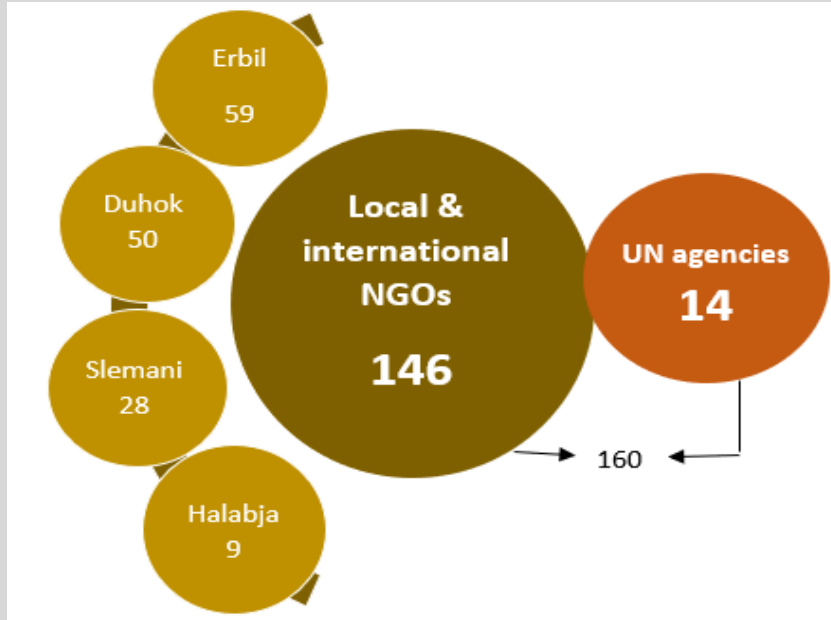
